Message from Chief of Police Bryce Johnson



I am very excited to present the 2013 Juneau Police Department Annual Report. The 2013 Annual Report will highlight the general crime trends of the City and Bureau of Juneau, activities of the Juneau Police Department, and significant personnel changes associated with the people who make up the Juneau Police Department.

This report is designed to provide usable information regarding trends and crime statistics that may impact the individual citizen. This report starts with that information so the reader can get a quick synopsis of where crime trends are moving. The remainder of the report is dedicated to a more personal look at the Juneau Police Department.

For the second year in a row since its peak in 2010, the overall crime trend is down. Juneau experienced a 13.83% decrease in violent and part I crimes from 2011 to 2012. Crime rates change for a variety of reasons. The rates have been tied to the age of the population, economic factors, substance abuse rates, and communities engaging in crime prevention tactics like improving lighting. This drop in the crime rate reflects those issues and includes the enforcement work of the police department and community policing partnerships between the Juneau Police Department and other groups. One development during 2012 involves an issue important to me personally. Juneau saw the formation of a mental health court to divert those with mental health challenges away from low level crime into services and support. The Juneau Police Department is proud to play its part in this shared community achievement of falling crime rates.




Juneau experienced an overall 78% increase in reported robbery crimes over the last five years, but we are currently at a four-year low.



Juneau experienced an overall 9% increase in reported aggravated assault crimes over the last five years, with a significant decrease in the last year.





Debra Rathbone started heading up the JPD Records Department early in 2012 and is doing a fine job. Debra's sunny disposition has made a great addition to JPD.





Officer Jeff Brink was re-hired at JPD in 2012 after spending some time working for the State of Alaska. He still remembered his JPD training and hit the ground running.






